As if that wasn't enough, this holiday season has brought [conflicts popping out all over Africa](#) and [armed sociopaths targeting children in the U.S.](#) Economic structural adjustment programs, renamed "[Austerity](#)" and touted as the only solution to worldwide economic collapse, continue to be forced onto countries – meaning: workers – worldwide, even as [compelling evidence](#) demonstrates that they don't work.¹

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Summary of PIET Meeting Minutes

Since assuming the director's role in March, there has been some confusion/blurring of what is exclusively PIET and what is the Peacebuilding Institute (PI). In keeping with that recent trend, this meeting had both PI and PIET topics. Essentially PI is an online networking service; however to keep our group from becoming one in name only, we need to highlight recent activities. Such recent activities would be from groups like PIET, thus showing the importance of affiliates being active, and also providing reasoning for such blurriness when it comes to PI and PIET.

THOUGHTS ON ECONOMIC JUSTICE

WHAT IS IT?- WHY IS IT SO IMPORTANT?

David Korten's view in his book *Agenda for a New Economy* (Berrett-Koehler, 2nd ed., 2010) is crucial to understanding these questions. Here is a summary of his thinking. (cf. pp. 23-24)

"Climate chaos, the end of cheap oil, collapsing fisheries, dead rivers, falling water tables, terrorism, genocidal wars, financial collapse, species extinction, thirty thousand child deaths daily from poverty – and, in the richest country, millions squeezed out of the middle class – are all evidence of the monumental failure of our existing cultural stories and the institutions to which they give rise."

"At first, each of the many disasters that confront us appears distinct. In fact, they all have a common origin that our feeble "solutions" fail to address for lack of an adequate theory". The origin is our economy. Korten notes on page 15 a fable about the number of babies floating down stream that required a continuous rescue operation. But no one looked upstream to find how they were getting into the water. Our attempts to solve to our troubles often reflect this approach. They fail to address the upstream causes stemming from our economic institutions,

partly due to all the effort and resources needed for immediate rescue operations. Hence fundamental change is minimal.

Economic justice is based on a just economic system. Korten defines six criteria for such a system:

1. Provide every person with the opportunity for a healthy, dignified, and fulfilling life;
2. Restore and maintain the vitality of Earth's natural systems;
3. Nurture the relationships of strong, caring communities;
4. Encourage economic cooperation in service to the public interest and democratically determined priorities;
5. Allocate resources equitably to socially and environmentally beneficial uses;
6. Root economic power in people- and place-based communities to support the democratic ideal of one-person, one-vote citizen sovereignty.

Our present economy falls far short on all these.

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THE SPARROW SINGS

December, 2012

"The Sandy Hook massacre isn't just about the need for gun control laws, it is about a culture that condones the killing of children and teaches children that killing is acceptable. It is about a country addicted to violence on television and movie screens. It is about cuts in education and services for the mentally ill. It is about giving the military free access to our schools, even Christian schools that claim to follow Christ who told us to love, not kill, our enemies. It is about environmental and health policies that expose our children to all manner of toxins in the air, land and water. It is about thinking we have the right to kill children with drones or by dropping toxic munitions, that cause birth defects and miscarriages, on their countries. It is about saddling our children with crippling education debt and no prospect for jobs. It is about telling boys and men they have to be tough and to fight and kill for what they want or think is right. It is about national policy that denies children basic rights and systematically teaches them that violence is acceptable. All the reporting on the young victims never report the root causes of this tragedy." ([Lucinda Marshall](#), Founder and Director of the Feminist Peace Network)

"The usual response to our vigils at the gun stores and gun shows is 'Cars kill more people than guns. Should we ban cars?' Our

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response is that cars are built to transport people. However, the sole purpose of a gun is to do violence to others. People who own guns are those ready to do violence to another to protect property and person. People are not more secure with guns. A Harvard research showed that homicides with guns were much more prevalent in states that have more guns available to the public and that gun owners' families are almost twice as likely to be murdered and 17 times more likely to commit suicide with a gun. There were 61 mass murders in the past 30 years in the U.S." (Mother Jones, Dec., 2012)

Some 85 Americans are shot to death each day in the U.S. On average, two children per day are killed with guns. (RSN, 12/31/12) As of Dec. 28, there were 306 homicides with guns since the Sandy Hook killings with 500 gun deaths in Chicago this year. (*Slate*) The number of mass killings doubled since the expiration of the federal assault-weapons ban in 1994. We have far more homicides with guns than do the Europeans. Last year, England, Germany and Finland had fewer than 50 homicides with guns. Israel and Switzerland allow anyone to carry a gun, but now they have tightened the gun laws substantially. In the U.S. guns are sold covertly to people with criminal backgrounds, especially at gun shows. Straw purchases are common with little consequences for the guns' sellers. We feel that anyone who sells a gun to another is an accomplice of a crime if that gun is used to commit a crime. If I drive someone to a bank so the person can rob the bank, I am an accomplice to the robbery. The same with the one who sells a gun since the gun's sole purpose is to do violence to another. The N.R.A. claims that guns protect us and that they are absolutely needed to be safe.

This is not true, according to the research done on this matter. The N.R.A. makes a lot of money with their misstatements to the public and spends millions on lobbying for looser gun laws. Their motivation for promoting guns is greed, not need. The very wealthy group of corporations called the American Legislative Exchange Council (ALEC) financially supports the N.R.A. And while gun violence has human costs, it also comes with a substantial economic cost. A Center of American Progress study of violent crime in eight American cities found that three types of violent crime – homicide, robbery, and aggravated assault – cost taxpayers \$3.7 billion a year in higher medical costs, spending on police and courts and lost productivity from crime victims and criminals. The yearly cost of violence crime in these eight cities averages \$320 per taxpayer. People who want to be secure must realize that violence does not make one more secure. Gun owners claim that they have a constitutional right to own guns. However, the Constitution gives the militia the right to carry firearms, not private individuals. Those who choose not to buy guns also have rights, including the right to walk down our streets and go to school without worrying that someone with a gun will be around the corner to threaten us or shoot us and our children. We join [MICAH](#) in going to the sites in Milwaukee where people have been killed with guns and pray with the victims' families and the perpetrators of the homicides, and usually every week we have two or three vigils. The victims have lost their most sacred right, the right to life.--Don Timmerman

INTERESTING FACTS

According to Human Rights Watch, the number of mentally ill inmates in U.S. prisons quadrupled from 2000 to 2006, and it continues to rise. In fact,

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the rate of inmate mental illness is five times greater (56%) than in the non-incarcerated population. Now that most state-run treatment centers and hospitals are closed, prison is now the last resort for the mentally ill. Last year, the U.S. imprisoned a record 425,000 immigrants. Private prisons profit greatly from this. Some charge the government as much as \$160 per night per prisoner kept.--*Guardian UK*, 12/3/12

The U.S. exported \$336.5 million worth of firearms in 2011. The N.R.A. is trying to block a U.N. treaty in which governments agree not to export weapons to countries that are under an arms embargo, or to export weapons that would facilitate “the commission of genocide, crimes against humanity, war crimes, or other violations of international humanitarian law.--*The Guardian UK*

The number of soldier suicides in Afghanistan this year has outnumbered combat deaths. That's a suicide a day --CBS News

Livestock in areas where “fracking” is occurring are getting sick and dropping dead in alarming numbers. “Fracking” seems to be poisoning the water they drink, since certain highly toxic chemicals are used in the process of extracting oil from the sand.--*Readers Supported News*, 12/3/12

Last year all the world’s nations combined pumped nearly 38.2 billion tons of carbon dioxide into the air from the burning of fossil fuels such as coal and oil. That is about a billion tons more than the previous year.--*Nature Climate Change*

– Wealthy nations are spending five times more money on fossil fuel subsidies than climate aid. The U.S. spent \$13 billion on fossil fuel subsidies in 2011 and just \$2.5 billion on climate aid.--*Democracy Now*, 12/4/12

The U.S. solar industry employs 119,000 in 5,600 companies in the U.S. That is more than are employed by coal mining in the U.S.-- *EcoWatch*, In a study called *Why Civil Resistance Works*, Dr. Maria J. Stephan and Dr. Erica Chenoweth analyzed 323 resistance movements that took place between 1900 and 2005. They discovered that 53% of nonviolent campaigns succeeded, while only 26% of violent campaigns achieved their objectives. In a separate report examining 67 transitions from authoritarianism between 1972 and 2005, Freedom House revealed that nonviolent organizing was the “key factor” in 50 transitions; campaigns that primarily employed nonviolence were substantially more likely to remain free than cases where violence was the key factor.
